Dear Chairman Grijalva:

Americans are increasingly concerned with the opportunity costs of Democrats' impeachment fixation. Due to this singular focus, important issues facing the American people have gone neglected. Bipartisan Congressional activity has ground to a halt, at least in the House, where partisan politics now overwhelmingly take precedent over policymaking. Our Committee is not immune from these unfortunate consequences.

We are amid yet another prolonged catastrophic wildfire season. With deaths reported, millions of acres burned, and hundreds of buildings destroyed, citizens remain wary of Congress's ability to improve the situation. Last year's wildfires destroyed nearly nine million acres of land and inflicted lethal havoc on western communities. Thoughtful proposals from members on both sides of the aisle in the House and Senate have been offered to improve forest health and mitigate the destructive impacts of severe, uncontrollable fires.¹ Yet, this Committee has done nothing.

Our vast public lands in this country have fallen into chronic disrepair with a maintenance backlog totaling nearly \$20 billion. Rank-and-file Democrats and Republicans have coalesced around a thoughtful policy solution, H.R. 1225, the *Restore Our Parks and Public Lands Act*, and worked to build 329 bipartisan sponsors in support of the bill. H.R. 1225 is one of the most diverse, widely supported bills in the history of the House of Representatives. H.R. 1225 has support from over 85 percent of House Democrats, including 87 percent of all freshman Democrats, and 75 percent of the members of our Committee. The failure of the bill to move forward to a vote in the House can only be attributed to the majority's disdain for the political party label of the bill's sponsor. It would be wiser to spend more time encouraging Democrat leadership to schedule a vote on such bipartisan legislation instead of more partisan messaging bills that have no realistic path to becoming law.

In contrast, in previous Congresses under Republican leadership, thoughtful, bipartisan bills were welcome regardless of the sponsor's party. In the last Congress, the Committee reported 228 bills. Roughly 177 went on to pass the House and 50 or more became law, including a significant number of Democrat bills. Another 53 Democrat bills became law as part of S. 47, the bipartisan omnibus lands package negotiated in the 115th Congress.

Rather, we should be debating and advancing sound policies that will benefit the American public and help the federal government work for them, not against them. We should be working to make Americans' lives easier, not more difficult.

In the past, this Committee has demonstrated that it can place partisanship and dogma aside to advance bipartisan solutions. Let's us work together for the good of our constituents on a better, more productive path. Enclosed is a list of bills worthy of your consideration in this endeavor.
